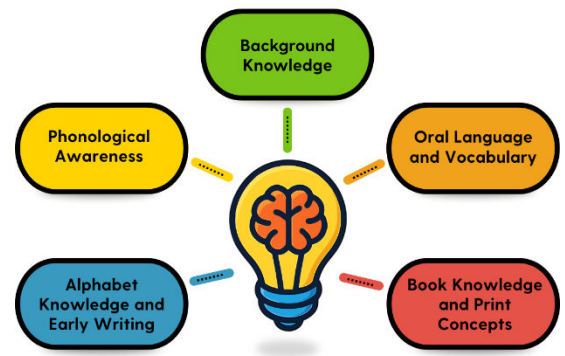

Beyond the Book: How The Big 5 Connect with Your Favorite Read-Alouds

“In order to be ready for school, young children who are dual language learners (DLLs) and those who speak English all require high-quality experiences in each of the Big 5—ALL day, EVERY day, EVERY child. The Big 5 are: Alphabet Knowledge and Early Writing; Background Knowledge; Book Knowledge and Print Concepts; Oral Language and Vocabulary; and Phonological Awareness.”

THE BIG 5

Components of Early Literacy

1. Background Knowledge

Children learn best when they connect new ideas to what they already know about the world—people, places, traditions, and everyday experiences.

Examples: Talking about what they see around them, asking questions, sharing family stories.

2. Oral Language & Vocabulary

As children listen and speak, they build the words and language skills needed to share ideas and understand others.

Examples: Having conversations, asking and answering questions, telling stories, learning new words in daily life.

3. Book Knowledge & Print Concepts

Children discover that print carries meaning, books have a beginning and end, and signs and symbols share information.

Examples: Looking at books, knowing where to start reading, talking about books, noticing labels and signs.

4. Alphabet Knowledge & Early Writing

Young learners begin to recognize letters, connect them to sounds, and try out early writing—from playful scribbles to forming letters.

Examples: Naming letters, scribbling, pretending to write, writing their name, seeing adults model good writing.

5. Phonological Awareness

Before children read letters, they explore the sounds in words by listening and playing with language.

Examples: Rhyming, clapping out syllables, blending or breaking words into parts, making silly word combinations.

In addition, the repetition and rhyming makes it easy and fun for students to join in!” “The letters are very helpful to each other when there are scrapes and bruises after the tree bends because the letters are too heavy.”
